Purpose

How knowledge and "know-how" are constructed by families in the case of West's syndrome (WS)?



Methods

A multidisciplinary research

- 30 families with children ages from 11 months to 15 years
- 60 semi-structured interviews with the mothers
- Participating observations at the hospitals and at the families homes (18 months)
- Exchanges analysis through the discussion forum (Facebook Enfants de West)

Preliminary Results

Emphasize the importance of experience in building mothers' knowledge of care.

Knowing how to do with uncertainties?




Diagram 1: The different levels of unpredictability

Knowledge as a necessary exchange




Diagram 3: Knowledge as an exchange between mothers

A process as the interface of knowing and "knowing how"




Diagram 4: Knowledge as a global process

Conclusion

How to build patient educational programs?



Emphazing through a diachronic process the families experiences ("knowing how") instead of only the medical "knowing that" help to adapt educational programs to families daily care.
