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1. Chemistry

1.1. General methods

Solvents and liquid reagents were purified and dried according to recommended procedures. Chemical reagents were purchased from Sigma-Aldrich, Alfa Aesar or TCI Europe and were used as received. Analytical thin-layer chromatography was performed with silica gel 60 F254, 0.25 mm precoated TLC plates (Merck). Compounds were visualized using UV light (254 nm) and a solution of cerium sulfate tetrahydrate and phosphomolybdic acid in 10% aqueous sulfuric acid as developing agent. Column chromatographies were performed using a Grace Reveleris[®] apparatus using 40-50 μ M silica gel. NMR spectra were recorded at 303K on a Bruker DPX250 (250 MHz for ¹H and 62.9 MHz for ¹³C) spectrometer. When specified, they were recorded on a Bruker DRX400 (400 MHz for ¹H and 100.6 MHz for ¹³C) spectrometer. The chemical shifts are reported in ppm (δ) relative to residual solvent peak.^[1] Mass spectra (MS) were recorded on a micrOTOFq (Bruker) ESI/QqTOF spectrometer. Melting points (M.p.) were determined with a Kofler bench and are uncorrected. FTIR spectra were recorded on a Perkin-Elmer spectrum 1000 spectrophotometer using a thin film deposition on NaCl window or KBr pellets. Elemental analyses were performed using a Thermofinnigan Flash EA 1112 apparatus.

1.2. Calculation of the clogP

The clogP values (octanol/water partition coefficients) were calculated in order to estimate the lipophilicity character of compounds **32** to **45**. These calculations were achieved using MarvinSketch software (Marvin 16.8.22.0, 2016, ChemAxon (http://www.chemaxon.com)).

1.3. Synthesis of bis-thiazoliums 4-17

General procedure: to a solution of α,ω -diiodoalkane (2.00 mmol) in CH₃CN (15 mL) was added 4methyl-5-(2-hydroxyethyl)thiazole (0.96 mL, 8.00 mmol) or 4-methyl-5-(2-methoxyethyl)thiazole^[2] (1.257 g, 8.00 mmol). The solution was heated to reflux under argon for 72 h, and the solvent was evaporated. The following is not related to compounds **13** to **17**. The residue was dissolved in water (40 mL), the solution was washed with ether (3 x 40 mL) and concentrated to dryness.

1,4-Butamethylene bis[4-methyl-5-(2-hydroxyethyl)thiazol-3-ium] diiodide (**4**). The residue was dissolved in hot EtOH (200 mL). Crystallization occurred at -18°C to afford 0.958 g (1.61 mmol, 80% yield) of yellow crystals. M.p. 175 °C. 1,5-Pentamethylene bis[4-methyl-5-(2-hydroxyethyl)thiazol-3-ium] diiodide (5). The residue was kept at 4°C until crystals appeared. They were suspended in a 1:1 mixture of CH₂Cl₂ and *i*PrOH and sonicated.

Filtration and washing with the same solvent mixture gave 0.639 g (1.04 mmol, 52% yield) of paleyellow crystals. M.p. 103°C. 1.4. Synthesis of bis-imidazoliums 32-38

1-(4-tert-Butylbenzyl)imidazole (23)^[3]

To a solution of imidazole (2.042 g, 30 mmol) in anhydrous DMF (20 mL) was added K₂CO₃ (2.764 g, 20 mmol) and 4-*tert*-butylbenzyl bromide (1.83 mL, 10 mmol). The suspension was stirred at 80 °C under argon for 7 h. EtOAc (50 mL) was added and the mixture was washed with water (5 x 30 mL). 1-(Naphthalen-2-ylmethyl)imidazole (24)^[4]

To a solution of imidazole (2.042 g, 30 mmol) in anhydrous DMF (20 mL) was added K₂CO₃ (2.764 g, 20 mmol) and naphthalen-2-ylmethyl bromide (2.21 g, 10 mmol). The suspension was stirred at 80 °C under argon for 12 h. EtOAc (50 mL) was added and the mixture was washed with water (5 x 30 mL). The organic phase was dried (MgSO₄) and concentrated to dryness to give 1.53 g of yellow liquid which was purified by column chromatography (eluent: CH₂Cl₂ \rightarrow CH₂Cl₂/MeOH, 95/5) to give 1.221 g (5.86 mmol, 53% yield) of yellow liquid. ¹H NMR (CDCl₃): δ 5.25 (s, 2H, CH₂), 6.93 (s, 1H, CH_{imid}), 7.11 (s, 1H, CH_{imid}), 7.24 (d, *J* = 7.5 Hz, 1H, H_{arom}), 7.49 (m, 2H, H_{arom}), 7.59 (br s, 2H, CH_{imid} + H_{arom}), 7.81 (m, 3H, H_{arom}).

1-Decylimidazole (25)^[5]

To a solution of imidazole (2.042 g, 30 mmol) in anhydrous DMF (20 mL) was added K₂CO₃ (2.764 g, 20 mmol) and 1-bromodecane (2.07 mL, 10 mmol). The suspension was stirred at 80 °C under argon for 12 h. EtOAc (50 mL) was added and the mixture was washed with water (5 x 30 mL). 2. Microbiology

2.1. Cell culture and reagents

Bacterial strains

For all experiments, the following bacteria have been used: *Enterococcus faecalis* (ATCC 29212, ABC 3), *Staphylococcus aureus* (ATCC 29213, ABC 1), *Escherichia coli* (ATCC 25922, ABC 5), *Pseudomonas aeruginosa* (ATCC 27853, ABC 4) and resistant clinical isolates: Vancomycin-Resistant *E. faecalis* (VRE, *vanA*, ABC 100), Methicillin-Resistant *S. aureus* (MRSA, *mecA*, ABC 61), Extended-Spectrum β -lactamase producing *E. coli* (ESBLE, ABC 28) and *P. aeruginosa* resistant to ticarcillin + clavulanic acid (PAR, efflux pumps, ABC 132).

All strains were kindly provided by the ABC Platform[®] Bugs Bank.

All bacterial strains were grown on Mueller Hinton Agar (MHA, Difco 225250) or Mueller Hinton Broth (MHB, Difco, 275730).

For bactericidal evaluation, strains were grown on Mueller-Hinton Agar, Cation Adjusted (MHA-CA, Difco 211438) or Mueller-Hinton Broth, Cation-Adjusted (MHB-CA, Difco 212322).

Eukaryotic cells

For the cytotoxicity assays, MRC-5 cells (ATCC CCL-171, human lung fibroblasts) were used. Cells were grown in Minimum Essential Medium (MEM, 31095-029, Life Technologies-Gibco[®]) supplemented with 10% heat-inactivated fetal calf serum (CVFSV00-0U, Eurobio, Courtaboeuf, France) and 2 mM L-glutamine (G7513-100 mL, Sigma Aldrich), at 37°C in a 5% CO₂ humidified atmosphere.

2.2. Antibacterial assay

To evaluate the antibacterial activities of the compounds, the Minimal Inhibitory Concentration (MIC) were determined by broth dilution method. Briefly, bacterial suspensions were prepared by suspending one isolated colony from MHA plates in 5 mL of MHB. After 24 h of growth, the suspensions were diluted in distilled water to obtain a final inoculum of 5×10^5 to 5×10^6 CFU (Colony Forming Units). The purity of the isolates was checked throughout the study by examination of colony morphology and Gram stain procedure. Twofold serial dilutions of the compounds were prepared in MHB in round-bottomed, untreated 96-well plates starting from a stock solution at 1024 µg/mL. An equal volume of bacterial inoculum was added to each well on the microtiter plate containing 0.05 mL of the serial compound dilutions. Each condition was repeated in 8 wells. After incubation for 18–24 h at 35°C, the MICs were determined with an ELISA reader (read at 540 nm Multiskan EX, Thermo Electron Corporation, France) as the lowest concentration of compound whose absorbance was comparable with the negative control wells (broth with compound, without bacteria). Results were expressed by means of at least two independent experiments.^[8]

To evaluate the bactericidal activity, bacterial suspensions were prepared by suspending 3 to 5 isolated colonies from MHA-CA in 5 mL of MHB-CA. After 24 h of growth at 35°C, the medium was removed by centrifugation (5 min at 3000 g) and cells were resuspended in 0.85% NaCl to obtain a 0.5 McFarland suspension. This suspension was then adjusted in MHB-CA at 1×10^6 [0.4 $\times10^6$ -1.6 $\times10^6$] CFU/mL. Twofold serial dilutions of the compounds were prepared in 0.05 mL MHB-CA in round-bottom, untreated 96-well plates. An equal volume (0.05 mL) of bacterial inoculum was added to each well. Each condition was repeated in the 8 lines of the microplate. Final bacterial concentration in the wells was 5×10^5 [2×10^5 - 8×10^5] CFU/mL, and the compounds concentrations ranged from 256 to 1 µg/mL except for

compound **42** (64 to 0.25 μ g / mL) for a final volume of 0.1 mL. In each line, a positive growth control (compound diluent, without compound) and two negative controls (0.05 mL MHB-CA with or without compound at the highest assayed concentration, and without bacteria) were included.

After incubation for 24 h at 35°C the content (0.1 mL) of wells at 1 x MIC and 4 x MIC were spread on MHA-CA plates and incubated overnight at 35°C for numeration. In order to evaluate the initial inoculum, 10 μ L of a growth control well were diluted at 1/1000 in NaCl 0.85% prior to initial incubation. 100 μ L were then spread on MHA-CA and incubated 16-20h at 35°C for numeration. In all cases the plate counts, performed in triplicate, were in the defined range between 20 and 80 CFU/plate (2x10⁵ to 8x10⁵ CFU/mL in the growth control well).

The bactericidal activity was defined as a \geq 3-log reduction of the initial inoculum with treatment compared with the untreated control, for a compound concentration not greater than 4 x MIC, after 24 h of incubation at 35°C.^[9] To control the sensitivity of the two reference strains, the MICs were also evaluated in the same conditions against two antibiotics (gentamicin and vancomycin). Results were in agreement with the expected values (\leq 1 µg/mL for both antibiotics on *S. aureus* ATCC 29213 and for gentamicin on *E. coli* ATCC 25922, and > 256 µg/mL for vancomycin on *E. coli* ATCC 25922).^[10,11]

2.3. Cytotoxicity assay

The MTT assay is based on the capacity of the metabolism of living cells to reduce MTT (yellow colour) to its insoluble formazan form (purple colour). This colour can be measured spectrophotometrically and the absorbance is proportional to the number of living cells.^[12]

Cells were plated at 10^4 cells per well in 96-well tissue culture plates (83.1835, Sarstedt) and grown for 48 h at 37°C in a 5% CO₂ humidified atmosphere. The medium was then discarded and replaced by fresh medium containing increasing amounts of the compounds (range 1–256 µg/mL) previously dissolved in dimethylsulfoxide (DMSO). The final concentration of DMSO never exceeded 2% of the final volume. Three different (negative) controls were added: medium alone, cells in medium and 256 µg/mL extract in medium (without cells). Each condition was repeated in eight wells. After 48 h incubation the medium was discarded, and cells were washed with PBS 100 µL of medium containing 0.5 mg/mL MTT prepared previously in PBS were added to each well and the plates were incubated for 4 h at 37°C. Then formazan crystals were dissolved by the addition of 100 µL of SDS (100 µg/mL), followed by incubation for 3 h at 37°C. Finally, the absorbance was measured at 540 nm *versus* 690 nm using a 96-well plate reader (Multiskan EX, Thermo Electron Corporation, France). Percentages of survival and the half maximal inhibitory concentration (IC₅₀) were then calculated. Experiments were repeated three times.^[8]

2.4. Minimum Inhibitory Concentration and IC $_{50}$ in $\mu Mol/L$

2.4.1. Bis-thiazoliums 4-17

2.5. Hemolysis assay

We examined the cytotoxic effects of compound **42** on human red blood cells (RBCs) from different blood group types (ABO, and Rh) and the results of the assay for 1 h are presented in the following Figure. The overall results show that the tested molecule has not a harmful effect on RBCs at IC_{50} relevant concentration. The molecule exhibited no hemolytic activity on RBCs after 1 h of incubation at 37°C, regardless of the blood group tested.

Materials and methods

The hemolytic activity of compound **42** was determined in peripheral human blood, from consenting adult healthy donors from three different blood types: A, B and O, including Rh-positive and Rh-negative individuals within the O blood type. Briefly, EDTA-anticoagulated blood was washed three times with PBS. Following dilution in PBS, 10^7 RBCs were treated with compound **42** (40 µg/ mL) molecule, and incubated at 37° C for 1 h. Following centrifugation at 800 g for 5 min, the supernatants were transferred to 96-well plates, and absorbance measured at 405 nm for released hemoglobin. Controls for 0 and 100% hemolysis consisted of cells suspended in PBS only and in 0,1% Triton X-100, respectively. The percentage of hemolysis was calculated as [(A_{405nm}, molecule - A_{405nm}, PBS)]/(A_{405nm}, 0,1% Triton X-100—A_{405nm}, PBS)]/100.

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
