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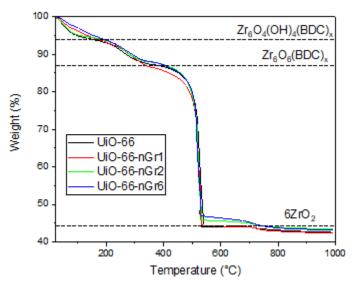


Figure 1S. TG in air for the UiO-66 and UiO-66-nGr samples.

The number of ligands is estimated by thermal analysis. TGA reveal that the weight loss occur in three steps as indicated in Figure S3. Up to 200 $^{\circ}$ C, solvent in pores is evaporated. Then up to 365 $^{\circ}$ C the dehydration of the material can be observed, and finally, the decomposition of the linkers occurs up to 600 $^{\circ}$ C. Since 6 ZrO₂ is produced during this last step for each Zr₆O₆(BDC)_x unit decomposing, the number of ligand x can be calculated from the weight loss W between 600 and 365 $^{\circ}$ C, using the following equation:

$$x = \frac{643.2 \text{ W} + 96}{164.1 \times (1 - \text{W})}$$

The results are shown in Table S1. The pure UiO-66 prepared contained an average of 4 linkers per formula unit and the incorporation of nGr slightly decreases it. It has to be noted that nGr

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also decomposes around the same temperature as the linkers and this was not taken into account in our calculation, leading to a small overestimation of the number of ligands in the composite.

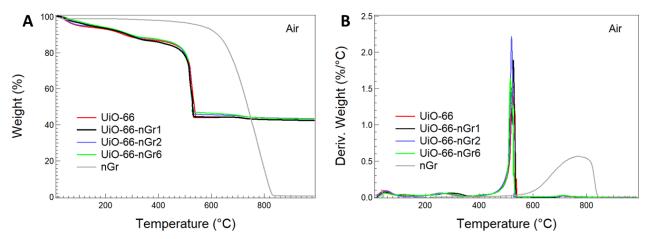


Figure 2S. TG (A) and DTG (B) curves under air flow for pure UiO-66, nGr and UiO-66-nGr composite samples.

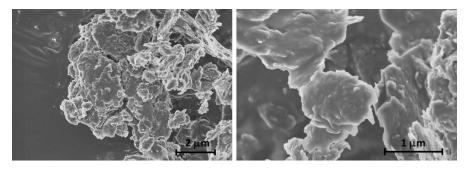


Figure 3S. SEM images of the nGr sample.
