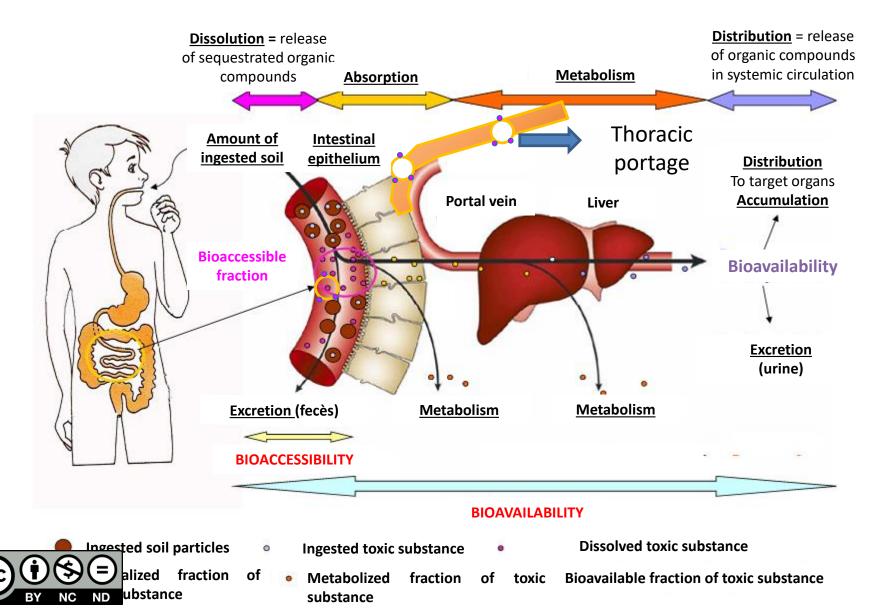


I- EXPOSURE ASSESSMENT AND RELATIVE BIOAVAILABILITY

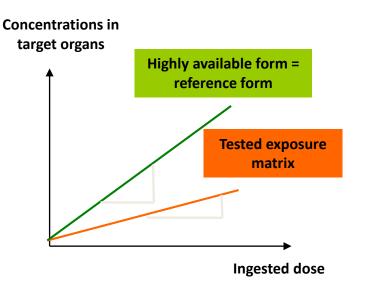


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I.1- Place of bioavailability in exposure assessment



I.2- Relative bioavailability and comparison of exposure media



BR = slope ratio

Use in order to validate bioaccessibility methodology.





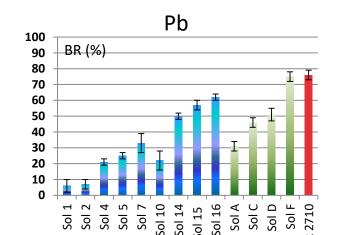
Validity criteria

□ same dose-response pattern between exposure and reference media

□ Assessment of relative bioavailability inside linearity domain of the dose response patter

Interests

Based upon biological effects, target organs specialized in accumulation, metabolism, excretion of compounds
 Used by sanitary agencies



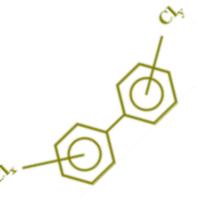

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I.2- Population at risk and NDL-PCBs hazard



- Family of 209 congeners
- Bioaccumulative and ubiquitous (POPs)
- 7 PCBs frequently retrieved in environmental matrices and foodstuff are basis of regulatory approaches
 - PCB 28; PCB 52; PCB 101; PCB 118; PCB 136; PCB 153; PCB 180
- 2 differents toxicity profiles: Dioxin like and **non-dioxin-like**

Children (1-3 years) = population at risk



- Children behavior: hand to mouth
- Vulnerability
 - Immature metabolism
 - Development phase
- ⇒ Increased exposure and sensitivity to toxicity impairments.

US-EPA (2011) : 200 mg/j of soil and/or dusts for children (0 à 6 years).



II.2- Animal model for children animal exposure.



- Manipulation advantage
- Absorption mechanisms differs than those of human
- Coprophagia and intestinal and gastric pH differs to.



- Ethical consideration concerning manipulations of primates. Closest model to human.



- **Adequate model** of digestive tract of children.

- Slow development.
- Few coprophagia.

-Determine variation factors of bioavailability of NDL-PCBs contaminated soils.

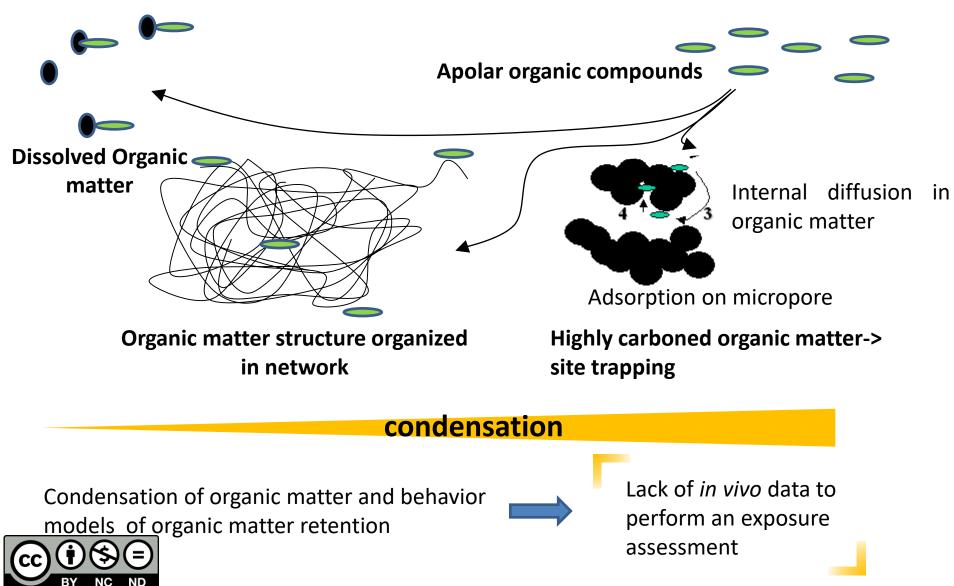
-Impact of these variation factors on NDL-PCBs relative bioavailability



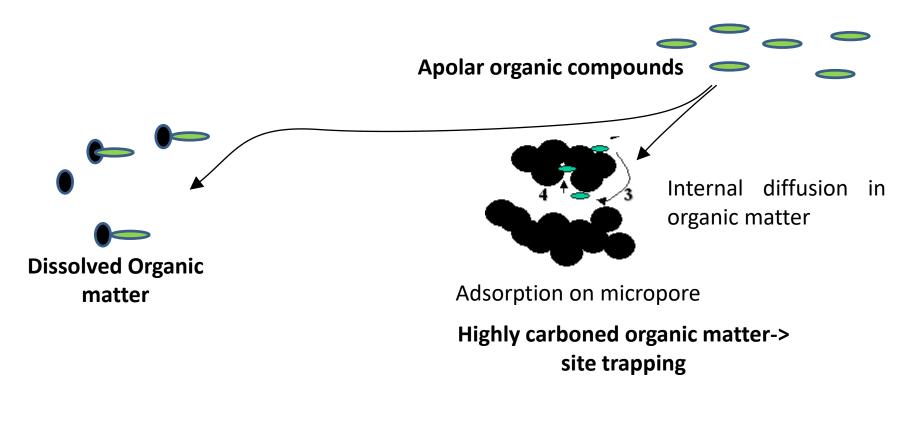

Important retention of NDL-PCBs

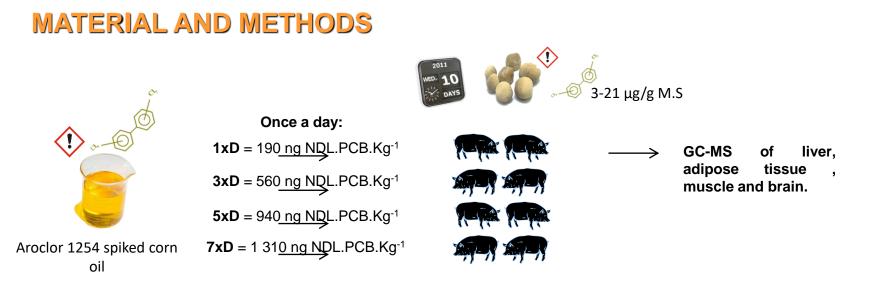

4 groups (n=2) of castrated weaned piglets were exposed during 10 days;

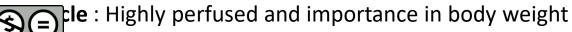

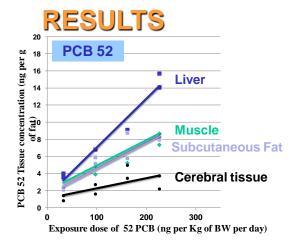

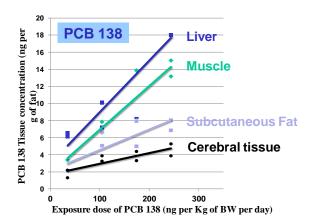
-Adipose tissue : lipophilic and bioacumulative caracteristics of NDL-PCBs. -Liver : metabolism.

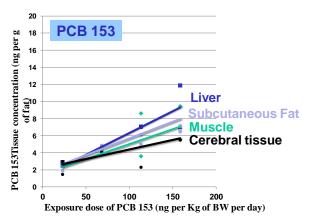
-Brain : neurological toxicity of NDL-PCBs

- Similar responses were obtained from all studied congener
- Linear regression is significant for liver, muscle and adipose tissue.
- Higher concentrations were obtained in liver.

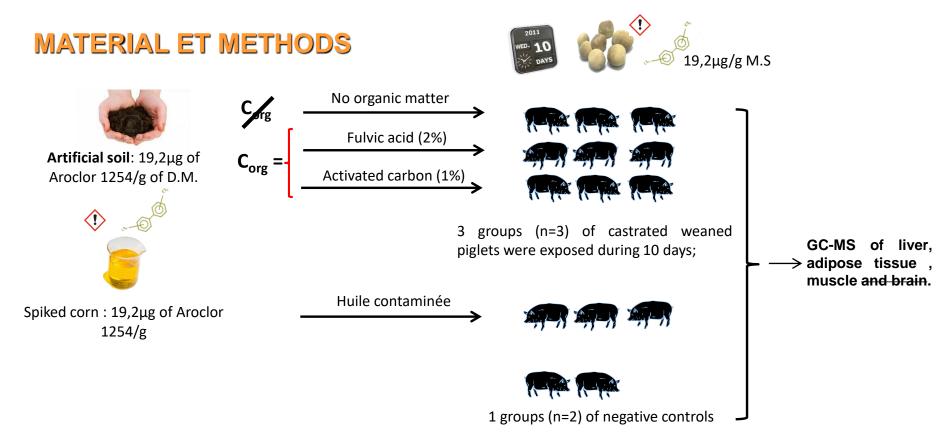

- Carebrah tissue doesn't provide asignificantly = ationship ND

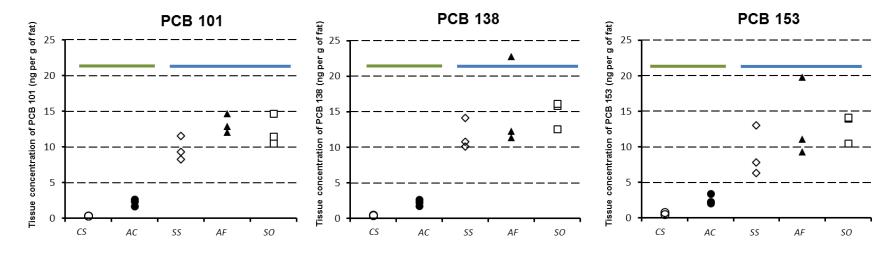

RESULTS



- Soil containing 1% of activated carbon presents a clear decrease of bioavailability Le sol contenant 1% de charbon actif **présente une nette diminution** de la biodisponibilité par rapport aux autres sols.
- Fulvic acid amendment doesn't seems to modify relative bioavailability of NDL-PCBs comparatively to standard soil





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
