
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
### INTRODUCTION

Exposure assessment to polychlorinated biphenyls (PCBs) from contaminated soils is a critical issue in terms of human health. especially since little reliable information on transfer of PCBs to humans via involuntary soil ingestion is available. Indeed, young children (1-30 months) with their hand-to-mouth activity may be exposed to contaminated soils. The relative bioavailability (RBA) approach is chosen in order to compare the bioavailability of organic pollutants from different soils (USEPA 2006).

The current study addresses the impact of soil organic matter (OM) quality on bioavailability of sequestrated NDL-PCBs



### **RESULTS AND DISCUSSION**



### Concentrations (ng g<sup>-1</sup> of fat) of PCB 153 in adipose tissue.

Errors bars correspond to standard error (n=5). Values presenting a common letter do not significantly differ (P<0.05).

#### Three different sets of NDL-PCB concentrations in adipose tissue can be distinguished (p<0.05):

- AC: close to background level (NC)
- SP, SPAC and HA: intermediate levels indicating a medium sequestration by organic matte
- SO, SS and FA: high concentrations and no significant reduction

### Relative Bioavailability factors of NDL-PCBs.

RBA factors were calculated from adjused means of concentrations (ng g¹ of fat). Values in brackets indicates 95% confidence interval (2xSE). Values presenting a common letter do not significantly differ (P<0.05). RMSE: Root means square error. RBA: relative bioavailability. 95% CI: 95% confidence interval.

- Highly condensed material (AC) strongly reduces relative bioavailability
- AH, SP present significantly reduced relative bioavailability
- SPAC also, but competition between AC and SPAC may occur explaining that reduction is not as strong as those of AC
- Along chloration RBA increases which may reveal increase in deposit in adipose tissue




Desorption occurs in the digestive lumen which is an aqueous environment.

Desorption could be very low for condensed material as AC.



Solubilisation of lipophilic compounds as NDL-PCBs is rather low.

Apparent solubilisation can be induced by transport vehicle like micelles or soluble organic matter



Proposal of mechanistic retention and bioavailability of NDL-PCBs bound to Organic

## Transportation to epithelium wall

PCB\*OM:

p=0.050

Before the uptake, NDL-PCB have to migrate to intestinal wall crossing a particuliar aqueous phase: the unstirred water laver.

This could be a physical limitation for NDL-PCB physically bound to organic matter.



Uptake of NDL-PCBs in micelles, solubilised or bound to digestible soluble organic matter could then occur.

### CONCLUSION

- Organic matter plays a major role in the retention of NDL-PCBs during the digestive process in piglets.
- It appears also that characteristics of the organic matter dramatically pilot the retention of NDL-PCBs.
- Condensed organic matter (activated carbon) strongly reduces bioavailability whereas the less condensed one (fulvic acid) has not significant effect
