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Assessment of the impact of organic mater in NDL-PCBs sequestration in industrially contaminated soils: comparison of an *in vitro* bioaccessibility and an *in vivo* relative bioavailability assays.





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INTRODUCTION

Little reliable information on transfer of PCBs to humans *via* involuntary soil ingestion is available although young children (1-30 months) with their hand-to-mouth activity may be exposed to contaminated soils. The relative bioavailability (RBA) approach appears to be an **adequate method** to compare **the bioavailability of organic pollutants from different soils** (USEPA 2006).

Because of coats induced by such methods, we've tried to compare in vivo results to a new in vitro physiologically based methodology. This study presents preliminary in vivo results and the in vitro methodology which is employed in our laboratory.

The current study addresses both the impact of soil organic matter (OM) on bioavailability of sequestrated NDL-PCBs and an emerging *in vitro* method to assess it.


Contamination profile appears to be similar between soil samples despite their different location



Slope are expressed as the figure above. Relative bioavailability factors were calculated as ratio of the tested soil slope and the spiked corn oil one.

CONCLUSION

- Only three soils exhibited a weaker bioavalability of sequestrated NDL-PCB.
- Implication in risk assessment to contaminated field-management needs to be further investigated.
