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# Rearing kids on chlordecone contaminated soils: Activated carbon, a promising media to limit the transfer from soil to animal tissues

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## **1. Introduction**

Chlordecone (Kepone) (CLD) is an organochlorine pesticide, persistent organic polluant<sup>1</sup>, which was intensively used in French West Indies to fight the banana black weevil. Because of its toxicity and considerable levels in soil, it became a major threat for human health to address<sup>2</sup>. Recent studies have shown that chlordecone contained in soil is extracted during the digestive process and assimilated by animals<sup>3</sup>. Soil ingestion is the main exposure route for free range animals. In order to ensure the production of safe animal foodstuffs, it is necessary to reduce the transfer from soil to animal tissues.

# 2. Objective

The present study intends to test whether two different activated carbons (AC) : ORBO (activated coconut charcoal, specific surface area (SSA) of 1070 m<sup>2</sup>/g) DARCO (lignite activated carbon, SSA of 793 m<sup>2</sup>/g), could limit the CLD transfer from soil to animal.

### Hypotheses :

AC limits the absorption of CLD through soil ingestion. This effect depends on the properties of AC.

Extraction Analysis of CLD by LC-MS/MS. Detection by mass spectrometry using a triple quadrupole.

#### **Relative bioavailability calculation**



$$RBA_{\text{CLD}}(\%) = \frac{C^{\circ}_{AC}}{C^{\circ}_{SS}}$$

**RBA<sub>CLD</sub>:** relative bioavailability of CLD in tested soil amended with AC

C°<sub>AC</sub> and C°<sub>SS</sub> are respectively concentrations of CLD found in the same target tissue after ingestion of one AC soil or SS

RBA values (%) and respective 95% confidence interval are presented

NE: non estimated confidence interval as concentrations in adipose tissue were lower than LOQ Line without a common letter differ significantly (p>0.05)



<sup>#</sup>: < Limit of Quantification (LOQ=2 ng/g of DM) Column without a common letter differ significantly (p>0.05)

5. Conclusion & Perspectives

This study leads to conclude that :

- AC could dramatically reduce the relative bioavailability of CLD (up to 98% for ORBO).
- Extent of this limitation depends of the properties of AC.
  - This result obtained with artificial soils is considered as a first step prior to on-field experiments.
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
