Context

- Polychlorinated Biphenyls (PCBs), Dioxins, Furans (PCDD/Fs), and Chlordecone (CLD) -> Persistent Organic Pollutants (POPs) contaminating soils
- Laying hens → exposed species as they may ingest up to 30 g
 of soil per day in nonoptimal rearing conditions (1)

Material and methods

1) Artificial Soil preparation: sand + kaolin + sphagnum peat (OECD, 1984)⁽²⁾

2) Maturation

2 months

3) Treatment(2% by weight)

Uncontaminated soil

Contaminated 6 NDL-PCBs (50,6 μg/Kg MS) + PCB 77 (2,5 μg/Kg MS) + 11 PCDD/Fs (1399 ng/kg MS) Contaminated CLD (1000 μg/Kg MS)

4) Maturation

> 5) Exposure

3 months



Oral administration via pellets (80 g of pellets containing 10% of soil/ 2kg of BW/ day)

- Control SS (without any matrix)

 3 Biochars (BCs)
 - Biochars (BCS)
 - 3 Activated Carbons (ACs)

6) Analysis

- Sampling of egg yolks from D18 to D20
- Quantification by chromatography and mass spectrometry: LC-MS/MS (CLD) and CPG-HRMS (PCBs and PCDD/Fs)
- Determination of pollutants concentrations

Values correspond to the mean ± SE (n=3) concentrations of POPs in egg yolks. Group mean values with superscript asterisks are statistically different from non-amended soil (SS) (*: 0.05>P>0.01; **: 0.01>P>0.001; ***: P< 0.001) using a variance analysis and a Dunnett post-hoc test. Groups mean concentrations with different superscript letter (a, b, c) are statistically different (P<0.05) from each other using a complementary variance analysis followed by a Tukey post-hoc test on previously found significant groups.

Physico-chemical characterization of ACs and BCs

- No reduction in transfer was obtained with BC 1 due to the absence of micropores and mesopores and the low specific surface area in comparison with the other matrices
- A slight reduction was obtained with BC 2 and BC 3 because of their limited microporous and mesoporous surfaces
- AC 2 and AC 3 were the most efficient in reducing the transfer given their highest specific surface area and highest mesoporous surface, whereas AC 1 was less efficient because of its granular form
- Reductions in transfer were congener-dependent as follows: PCDD/Fs > PCB77 > NDL-PCBs = CLD

Conclusion and perspectives

- This study leads to the following conclusions:
- i) Activated carbon soil amendments can highly reduce the bioavailability of soil organic contaminants to laying hens especially for PCDD/Fs and PCB77
- ii) The contaminant reduction depends on both, the nature of pollutant and the characteristics of the matrix
- Amendment of contaminated zones by activated carbons could be subsequently applied on small areas
