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# Complementary function of arbuscular mycorrhizal fungi and protozoa fosters nitrogen acquisition of plants (*Plantago lanceolata*)



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## BACKGROUND

- Arbuscular mycorrhiza (AM) ameliorate the supply of mineral nutrients to plants in exchange of photosynthetically fixed carbon (C);
- Protozoa release mineral nitrogen (N) from consumed bacterial biomass ('microbial loop');
- Mineral N may be taken up by both, AM mycelium and plant roots;
- Protozoa enhance root growth and AM increase C allocation belowground, both potentially foster the 'microbial loop' processes.

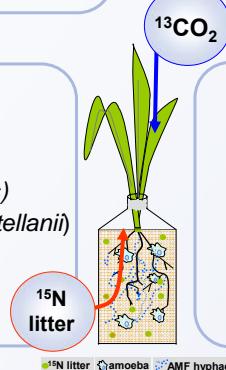
## QUESTION

- Do protozoa and arbuscular mycorrhizal fungi interact to foster plant N uptake from soil organic matter?

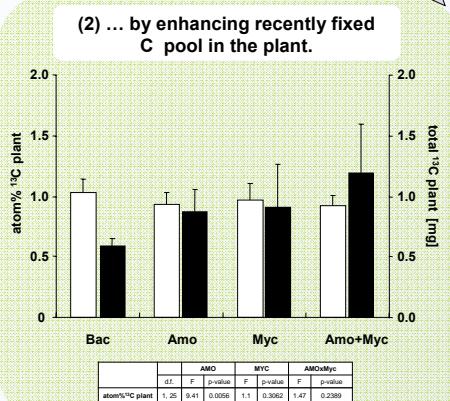
## MATERIALS & METHODS

### Microcosms:

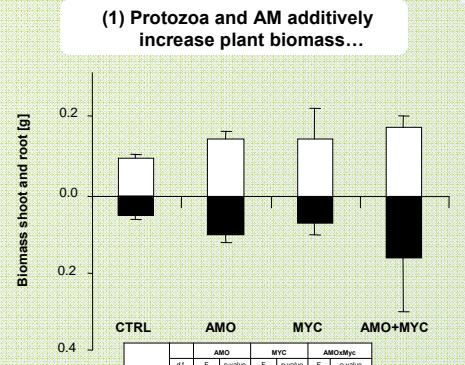
- containing soil with a diverse bacterial community
- + / - axenic arbuscular mycorrhiza (*Glomus intraradices*)
- + / - axenic soil protozoa (Amoeba; *Acanthamoeba castellanii*)
- with <sup>15</sup>N labelled litter → plant uptake of N
- <sup>13</sup>CO<sub>2</sub> pulse labelling → plant C allocation



## RESULTS



(2) ... by enhancing recently fixed C pool in the plant.



(1) Protozoa and AM additively increase plant biomass...

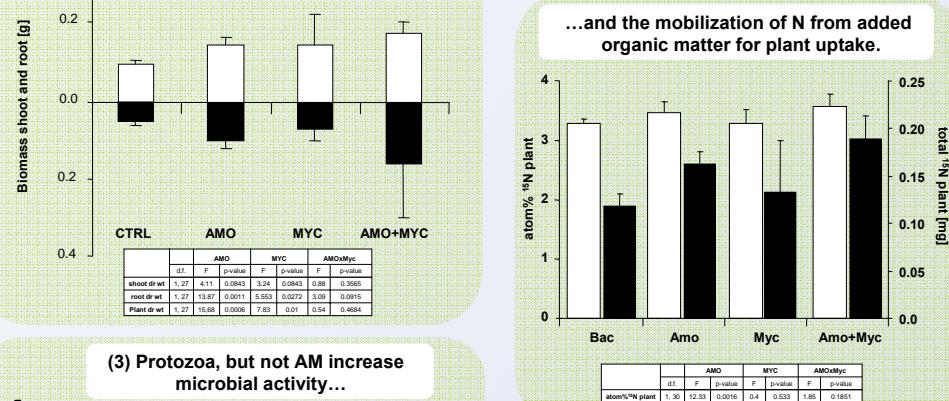
## TREATMENTS

CTRL : diverse bacterial community in soil

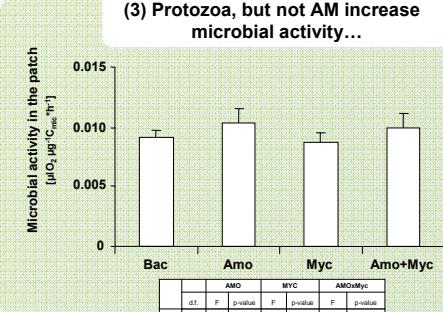
AMO : Amoeba and diverse bacteria in soil

MYC : Plants inoculated with arbuscular mycorrhiza (AM) and diverse bacteria in soil

AMO+MYC : Plants inoculated with AM, soil with diverse bacteria and amoebae



...and the mobilization of N from added organic matter for plant uptake.



(3) Protozoa, but not AM increase microbial activity...

## CONCLUSIONS

- AM fungi additively increase the effect of Protozoa on plant growth, recently fixed C assimilation and <sup>15</sup>N uptake;
- Protozoa promote the mobilization of N from added organic matter in soil by enhancing microbial activity in the rhizosphere;
- The presence of AM fungi contributes to plant N nutrition, most likely through transport of mobilized N;
- Root and hyphal interactions need to be studied separately to unravel the mechanisms in N uptake and C partitioning in the amoeba-mycorrhiza-plant-symbiosis.
