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## Compared effects of long term applications of pig slurry and ammonium nitrate on the structure and activity of the denitrifying community in a maize planted soil

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#### Introduction

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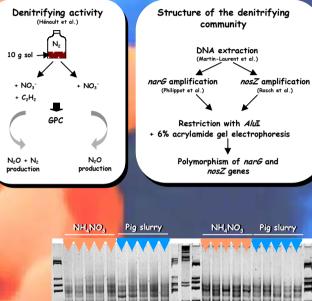
Denitrification is an alternative respiratory process by which nitrogenous oxides  $(NO_3^{-1} \text{ and } NO_3^{-1})$  are reduced to dinitrogen gases  $(N_2O$  and  $N_3)$ . In soils, denitrification plays an important role in the global nitrogen cycle and contributes to the emission of  $N_2O$ , a greenhouse gas.

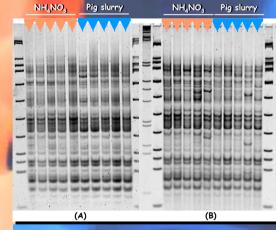
Carbon coumpounds of manures and survies are known to stimulate the potential denthifying activity of soils (Paul & Beauchamp, 1989), but their impact on the denthifying community remain unknown.

So, the aim of this study was to compare the effects of long term applications of pig slumy or a mineral fertilizer on the structure and activity of the denitrifying community.



Samples were collected from two experimental plots, cropped with maize, and fertilized during the last 10 years with ammonium nitrate (100 kg N ha<sup>-1</sup> an<sup>-1</sup>) or pig slurry. The effect of the fertilizers on the activity and the structure of the denitriying community were studied both on the rhizospheric and bulk will

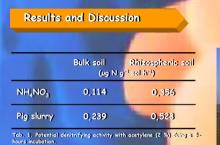




Eq. 3. Comparison of the AluZ RELPs of the *nand* PCR products obtained from the bulk (A) and the rhboxyletic (3) soil.

The restriction patterns of  $nar\mathcal{G}$  show a low variability between each replicate. They have not emphasized a strong effect of the type of fertilizer on the structure of the nitrate-reducing community either in the bulk and the rhizospheric soil.

The impact of those fertilizers on the  $N_{\rm g}\text{O}\text{-reducing community}$  is currently evaluated.



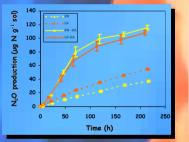


Fig. 1. Denitrifying activity with acetylene (2%). LP: pig slurny, FM: mineral fertilizer, SA: rhizosph<u>eric soil</u>

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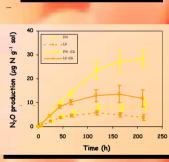


Fig. 2. Production of N<sub>2</sub>O during dentitification. LP: pig starry, Fills mineral fertilizer, SA: nhizospheric soil

The applications of pig slurry during 10 years have stimulated the potential dentitifying activity of the soil of 210 % compared to the soil fertilized with ammonium nitrate. The positive effect of pig slurry was observed in both the bulk and the rhizospheric soil (x 2,5 px0,05).

The potential denitrifying activity have also been stimulated into the nhizospheric soil. The effect of the nhizosphere and the pig slurny were additive (Tab. 1).

The amount of  $N_{g}O$  produced from dentitification was not influenced by the type of fentilizer during the first hours of incubation (Fig. 2). However, after this period (45 h), the amount of  $N_{g}O$  produced from dentitification was smaller in the soil fentilized with pig slurry compared with the soil fentilized with annonium nitrate while the potential dentitifying activity had been stimulated. Similar results were observed in the mineral fentilization induce a reduction of the amount of  $N_{g}O$  produced from dentitifying activity and been stimulated. Similar results were observed in the nitrospheric soil suggesting that the applications of pig slurry compared with the mineral fentilization induce a reduction of the amount of  $N_{g}O$  produced from dentitification.

In return, the denitrifying community and also the production of N<sub>2</sub>O have been highen in the rhizospheric soil than in the bulk soil (Fig. 2). Thus, the N<sub>2</sub>O/N<sub>2</sub> ratio does not seem to be modified by the activity of the maize roots. The effect of the pig slurry was also observed in the rhizosphere leading to a net reduction of the N<sub>2</sub>O produced.

To conclude, the applications of pig slurry stimulate the denitrifying activity and reduce in the same time the  $N_2O/N_2$  ratio of the process in anaerobiosis. The rhizosphere also stimulates this activity without any modification of the  $N_2O/N_2$  ratio. Moreover, the applications of the pig slurry and the rhizosphere does not seem to modify strongly the structure of the nitrate-reducing community. Currently, this work is continued with theinvestigation of the influence of the type of fertilizer on the structure of the  $N_2O$ -reducing community. Whether the effect observed with the pig slurry could be recovered for other manures or slurries is an interesting question.
