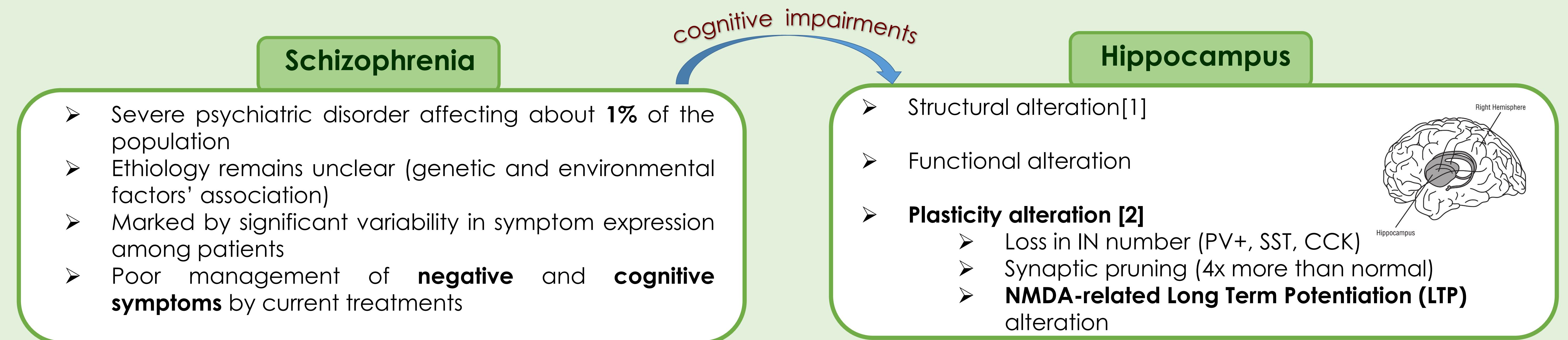

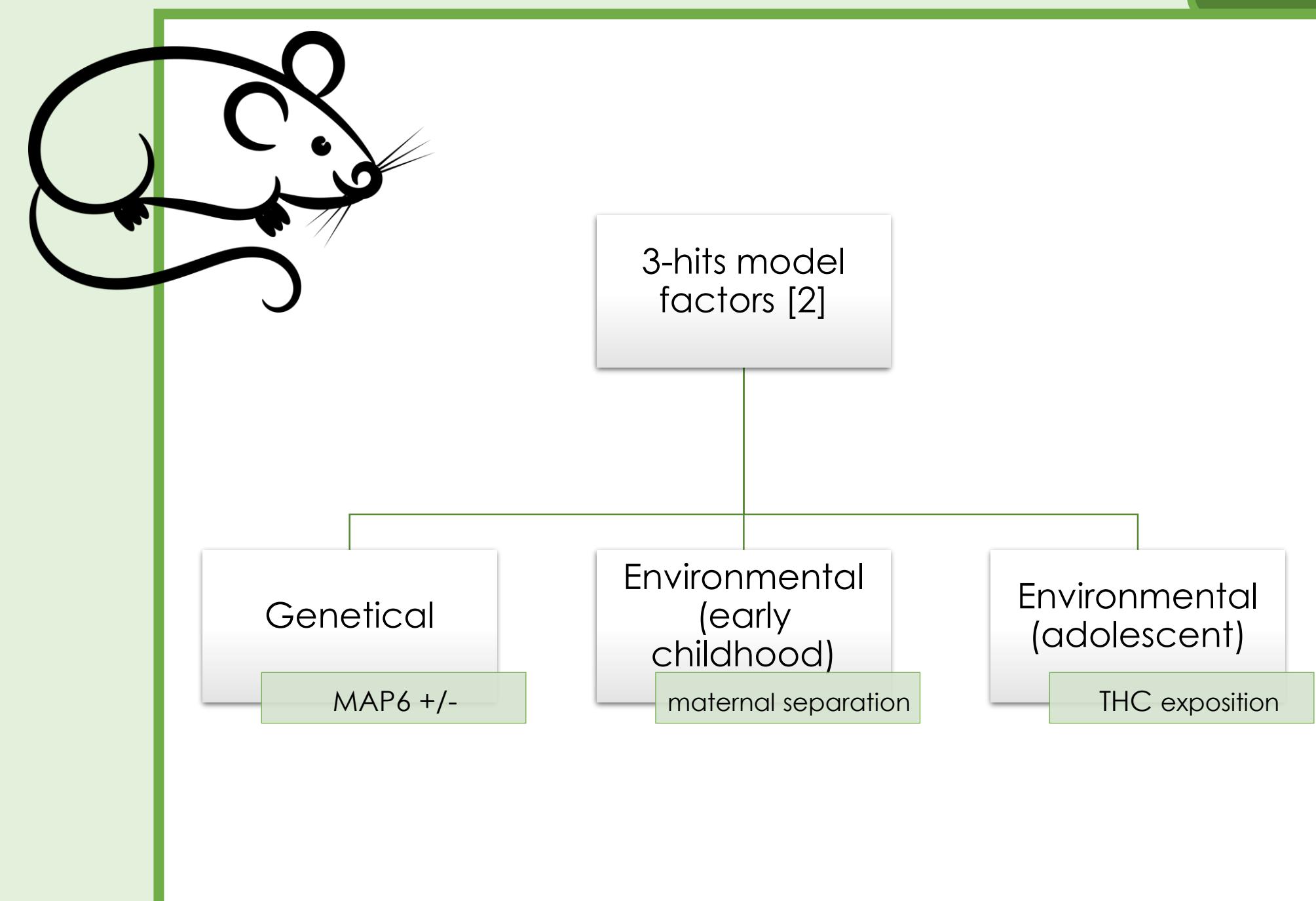

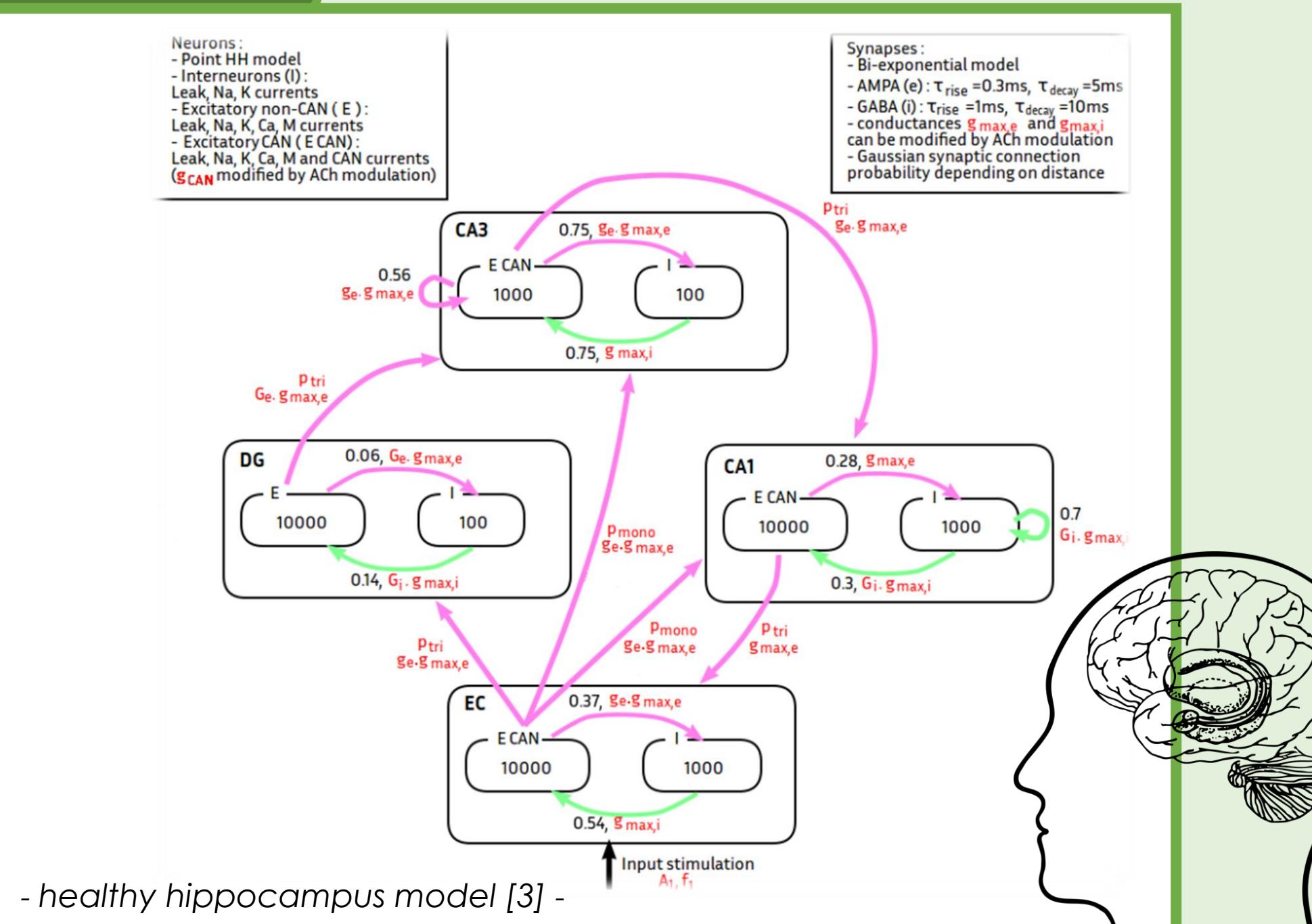

From biological data to computational modelling

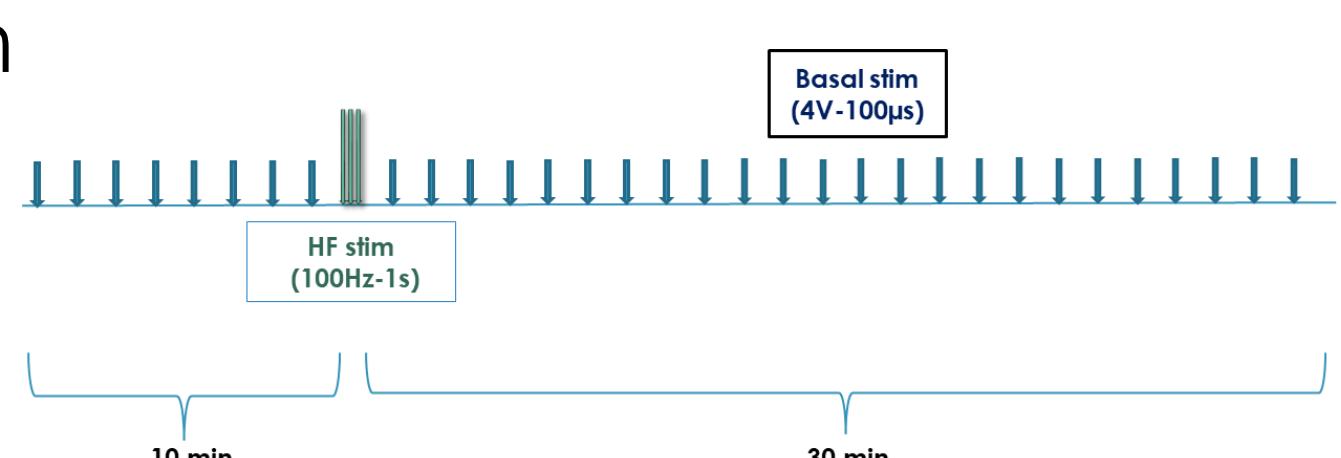
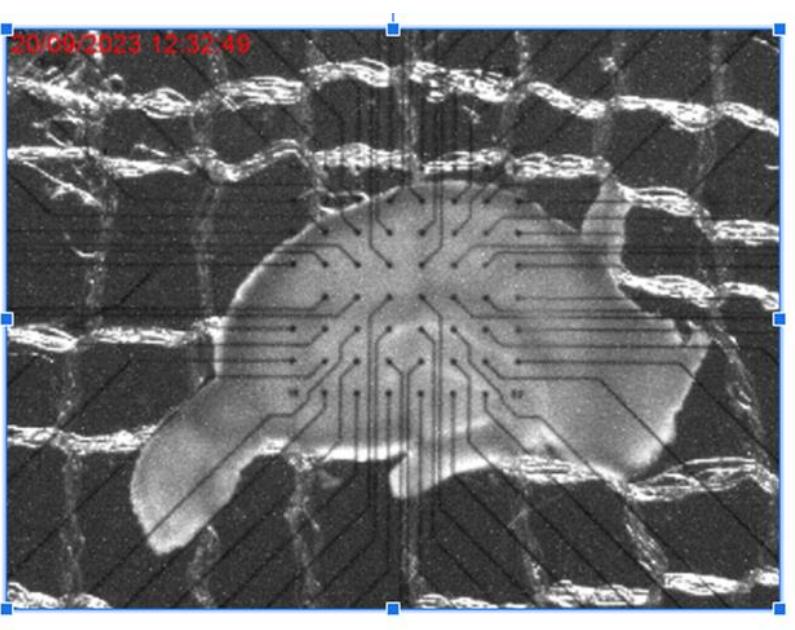


- Develop effective methods for processing and visualizing MEA data to isolate and characterize hippocampal synaptic plasticity.
- Optimize experimental protocol parameters to enhance the quality and relevance of the data obtained.
- Long term**: Integrate the extracted data into a computational model [3] to simulate hypotheses in schizophrenia.



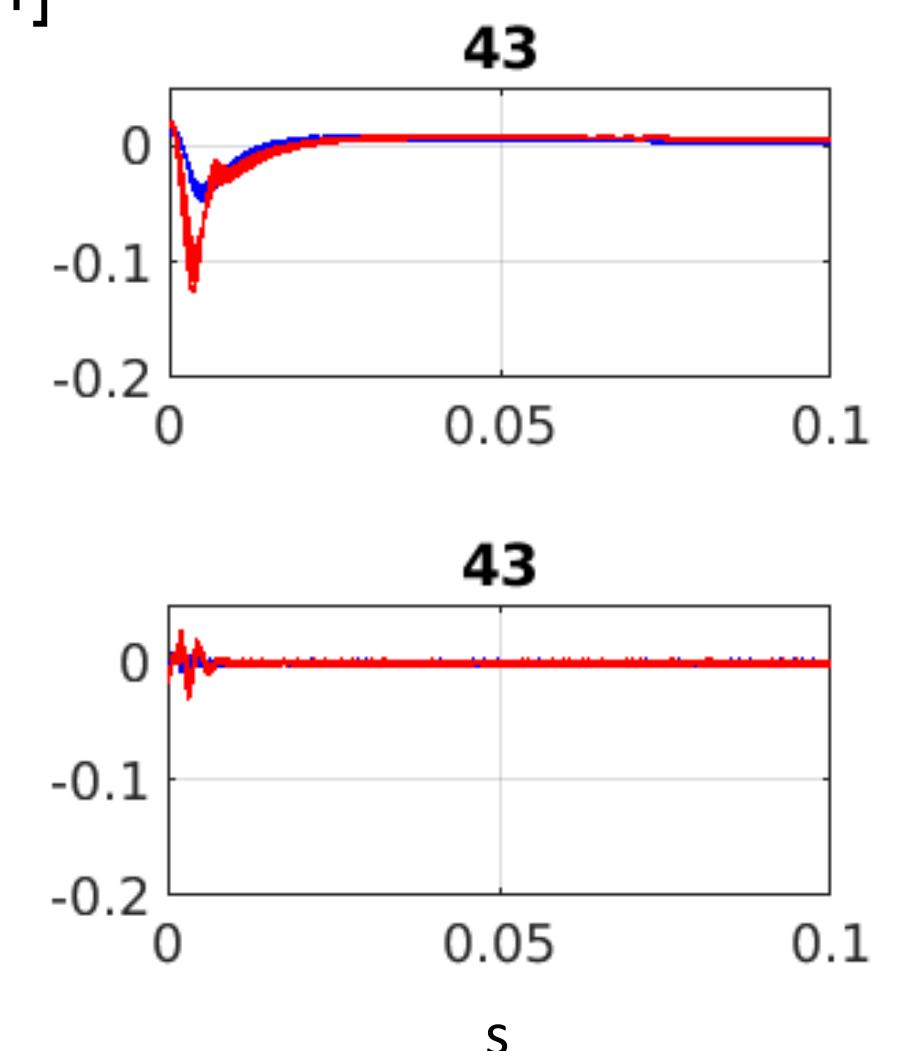
Material & Methods

- MEA200 composed of 60 electrodes
- High Frequency Protocol (HFS)
 - 10 min basal stim of the Schaffer collaterals
 - 1s high-frequency train (100Hz)
 - 20 min basal stim
- Induces an LTP



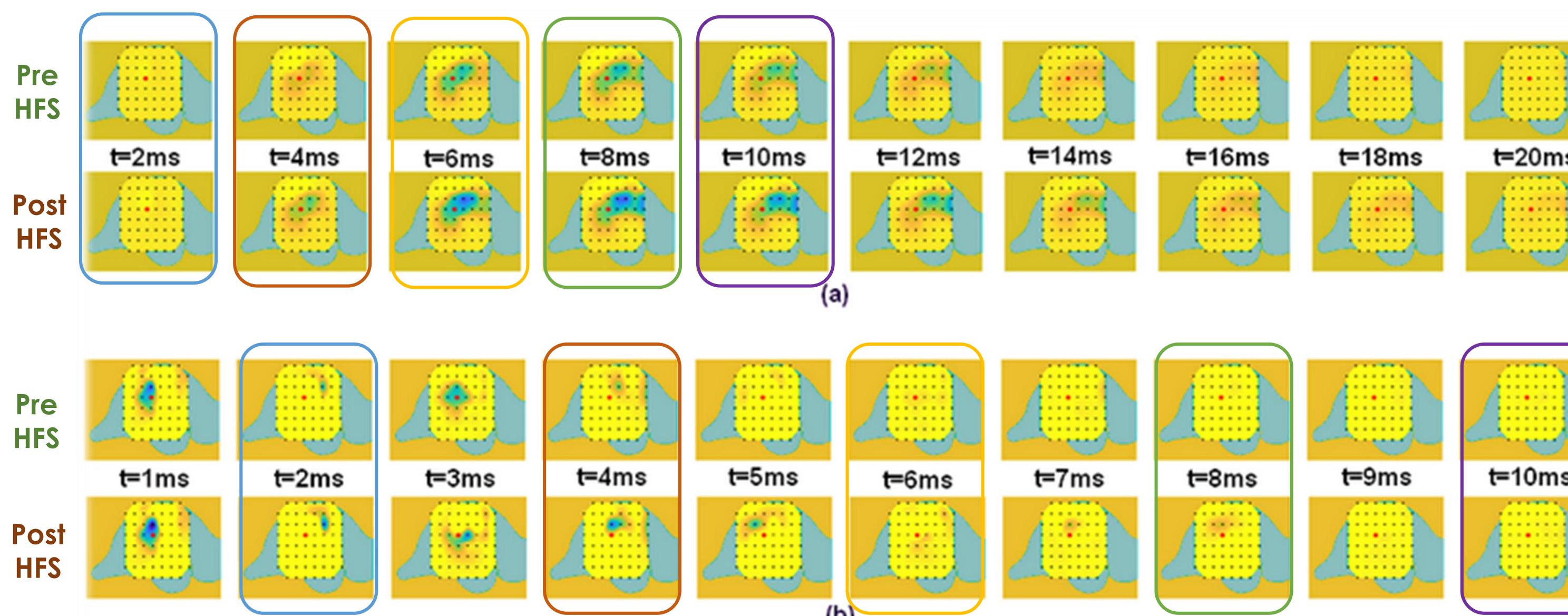
Data Processing

- Blanking/ reference canceling [4]
- Filtering
 - <80 Hz LFP (EPSP)
 - >300 Hz multi units
- Identifying basal stimulation
 - Before HFS (Blue)
 - After HFS (Red)
- Compute averages for each electrode



Results (wild type mice)

- There is a marked enhancement in synaptic activity post-HFS (**figure a**) in both intensity and duration, which could be correlated to a successful induction of LTP.
- The spatial evolution seems to follow the physiological path for synaptic transmission.



- The increase in spiking activity post-HFS (**figure b**) suggests that the neurons within the slice have become more responsive, likely due to enhanced synaptic efficacy caused by LTP or to the electric field's propagation.

Conclusion

- These preliminary results show a functional data processing pipeline and visualisation tool to continue our study.

Next steps

- Vary the experimentation (different protocols, stimulation zone and/or the stimulation characteristics)
- Validate the current results on more data
- Quantify plasticity and extract information that can be used in the computational model.
- Collect data from an SCZ animal model
